PREVENTION-BASED

PROGRAMS

Mi'gmaq Child & Family Services of New Brunswick continues to create and grow prevention programs in our communities. Our prevention programs aim to be holistic, culturally appropriate, trauma-informed, and are dedicated to working in the best interests of the child.

The immediate goal of prevention work is to stop children from coming into care by providing services in the home that maintain and enhance family functioning. The long-term goal is to support families through a traditional or cultural path, and to help our communities grow capacity and promote lasting resilience. Early prevention programs have received positive feedback from the families involved and we have seen more community members, and entire family groups come, to us for assistance before they reach a critical point in their situations. We look forward to continuing to bolster these programs in the coming years.

CULTURAL COORDINATORS (MCC)

Culture will always be the number one factor when it comes to teaching our children. The Mi'gmaq Cultural Coordinators continue to practice, teach and learn their culture. Each of the MCC's work hard to make sure their communities keep the culture and language alive through Mi'gmaq language and songs, how to make/use hand drums, sewing, beading, harvesting and preserving food, building a sweat lodge, and the importance of traditional ceremonies.

METEPENAGIAG (RED BANK)


Nin teloisi Victoria Augustine. I am a Spiritual Healer and Elder of Metepenagiag. My Spiritual Native name is Nukumi Samqwan (Grandmother Waters). I speak the Mi'gmaq language and offer cultural teachings like drumming. These cultural teachings help the community be proud of who they are as Indigenous people and learn the history and values of our Traditional ways. I integrate my knowledge and wisdom by living my life of the Seven Sacred Grandfather teachings. We are here to survive and be resilient in our way.



AMLAMGOG (FORT FOLLY FIRST NATION)

Kwe' Nin teloisi Nicole Porter, niin Oigi Amlamgog. I am the Mi'gmaq Cultural Coordinator for Amlamgog First Nation. I had the desire to get reconnected to my culture so my kids could have that connection as well. I will continue my cultural journey by building relationships with other Knowledge Keepers and Elders Then, bring these teachings back to my community thru ceremonies and other cultural events. TJIPOGTOTJG (BUCTOUCHE FIRST NATION)

Niin teloisi Manuella Caravantes, I am the Mi'gmaq Cultural Coordinator in Tjipogtog First Nation. Being an MCC through Migmaw Child and Family Services is one of the most rewarding positions I've had. Watching our youth take an interest in making their regalia and dancing at powwows always amazes me. Helping our children to become proud of, and interested in our ceremonies like, smudging, singing, and dancing is an honor. My mom always taught me the importance of language, culture, and being proud of who you are. I want to be a part of bringing that back to our people



















NATOAGANEG (EEL GROUND)

This year has been busy and exciting with all the anticipated changes and infrastructure coming to Natoaganeg. The new building, in this community, will house the Child and Family social workers, family support workers, and youth coordinators. We are eager to move into our new offices sometime in the summer months.

The community will see construction continue with a large solar field going up next to the building. This will reduce carbon emissions, and offer a renewable energy source for the building. We are also looking forward to using this as a teaching tool for the youth in our programs.























METEPENAGIAG (RED BANK)

This year has been filled with activity due to the construction taking place in Metepenagiag. We are looking forward to having our team in one building (Social Workers, Youth Coordinators, and Family Support Workers) and coming together to support the families in our community

The Nukumi House, together with the Mi'gmaq Cultural Coordinator, has been actively providing programs and services focused on youth and family wellness within the community. Some of the notable activities from the past year involved engaging our teenagers in crafting hand drums and beaded chokers. We also organized sessions for children to create medicine pouches. Additionally, we enjoyed spending time together fishing, kayaking, and swimming in the picturesque Miramichi River.







AMLAMGOG (FORT FOLLY)

Over the past year, Mi'gmaq Child and Family Services in Fort Folly has seen growth in the programs we were able to offer the community, these included, but were not limited to, homework sessions, movies, game/painting nights, cooking classes, petting zoos, and workshops to advance the mental, emotional and developmental well being of the child.

Nukumi House offered cultural programs like language, and beading classes, sharing circles, drumming/ singing circles, regalia-making workshops, and organizing sweat lodges and full moon ceremonies for all in the community to attend. We have also seen the creation of programming to enhance the wellness and mental health of the community through physical fitness.



We had drum and rattle-making sessions, medicine walks, and berry-picking outings. We offered a program based on the 7 Sacred Teachings and we were able to prepare meals for the community and host a fall photo shoot.

I want to share my gratitude to all community members for their participation over the last year. We always have a great turnout at all our activities and it is very much appreciated. It's by working together that we will ensure that our community has a bright and promising future







LNO MINIGO (INDIAN ISLAND)

We are excited about the new staff that has joined Mi'gmaq Child and Family Services over the past year, along with the construction of our Child and Family Development Centre, will provide us with more space for the community and allow us to organize even more activities.

TJIPOGTOTJG (BUCTOUCHE)




